Robert Penn Warren's "All the King's Men" is one of American literature's greatest political novels. This work describes the dramatic rise to power of Willie Stark, a one-time radical attorney who becomes a corrupt state governor and Jack Burden, the narrator, who loses his ideals, his career, and the love of his life by working as the governor's most trusted aide. We will highlight the themes that are most relevant to American political life today. These include the dangers that populism, demagoguery, tribalism, corruption, and the lust for power now pose to our constitutional system of government.



ARTISTS AND THEIR WORK

CLASSICAL MUSIC

Historically, social, political, and economic changes have had a dramatic effect on the evolution of classical music. We will explore classical music's steady transformation through time by examining classical music's diverse genres, styles, instruments, composers, compositions, etc. as they have materialized.

CONSTRUCTION: BEYOND BRICKS & MORTAR

Construction is back for a second semester! Once again your fellow Questers will stretch their minds to include varying projects that put things together in a coherent manner. They may be beneath your feet, all around you or simply in your mind. So join our presenters as they expand their creativity and discover what construction means to them.

CONTEMPORARY POETRY

We will explore different poetic forms and such schools of poetry as The New York School, The Language Poets and Cave Canem among others. Poems from the late 20th century through to today will be selected and discussed.

CONTEMPORARY SHORT STORIES

This long-standing class discusses short stories from all over the world. At each class, two members volunteer to choose and present a story, copies of which are made available to everyone. The presenters give a brief background about the author and of the story, and then open the class to discussion.

CREATIVE WRITING WORKSHOP

Each class begins with a ten-minute writing warm-up inspired by a prompt, such as ice cream, a favorite teacher, a memorable photograph. Other in-class writing might be related to the specific topic of the day: dialogue, openings, the senses, vivid description, or character development. All genres — science fiction, romance, mystery, memoir, comedy — are welcomed.

DAISY MILLER & WASHINGTON SQUARE NEW

Henry James was a 19th century American writer and a major figure in the history of the novel and a master craftsman in the development of his recurring themes. These include the relationship between innocence and experience and in his view the difference between the "uncultured Americans & the highly cultured Europeans." We will start with his novella "Daisy Miller"— then proceed to the novel "Washington Square."

EXPLORATIONS IN PHILOSOPHY & LITERATURE

Beginning this Spring, we are combining the courses "Great Conversations" and "Explorations in Philosophy" into a single course. For each session, we will read an essay, classic short story, or excerpt from a play. Each reading is selected for the stimulating ideas that it presents and its insights into social relations and human nature. We expect to continue the tradition of both courses, promoting lively and enlightening discussions.

DISTINGUISHED GUEST LECTURE SERIES

The bimonthly Guest Lecture Series enhances the Quest program experience by inviting recognized experts in their fields to present on varied subjects. Past presentations have included discussions on global policy and political science, literature, theater arts, social science, and music.

FASCINATING NON-FICTION

At each session, the presenter will tell you about a book you always wanted to read or about a book you never heard of but will be glad you now have. Selections run the gamut from the imaginable to the unimaginable. Every semester, an eclectic array of fascinating non-fiction awaits its audience. No advance reading is required.

FILM FOR THOUGHT

In this course we will see the best of contemporary short documentaries, dramas, comedies, and film excerpts. Films are selected both on their artistic merit and the probability of producing a lively discussion.

GREAT PLAYS

Important American and European plays are presented. Each session begins with a brief biography of the playwright followed by a "staged reading" of the play. The audience is encouraged to share their insights.

FOLK MUSIC & MELLOW ROCK

Each class will be devoted to one or two Folk/Rock artists or groups. We will learn about the artists and listen and/or sing along with them. Artists include Billy Joel, Rod Stewart, Carly Simon, Sonny and Cher, The Weavers, Peter, Paul & Mary, The Kingston Trio, and The Mamas and The Papas.

FOREIGN AFFAIRS

Through innumerable topics and themes, we will investigate and discuss the issues that affect both a specific population and the global population. Each presenter will select an issue of importance, present the history of the issue, and facilitate the discussion.

HARLEM RENAISSANCE

The Harlem Renaissance was a period of great change in America, the African-American community in particular. The presentations will show the impact the era had on the artistic, social and political terrain. The course will highlight iconic figures, such as Langston Hughes, Zora Neale Hurston, and Duke Ellington, as well as activists such as Marcus Garvey and Mary McCloud Bethune.



NEW & CLASSIC ESSAYS NEW

Each week the course coordinators will pick an essay designed to provoke new perspectives, to ask us to question assumptions, and to encourage thoughtful discussion. Topics will range widely and will be drawn from publications such as *The Atlantic*, *The New Yorker*, and *The New York Review of Books*, as well as some online only sources. Participants will be encouraged to read the essays prior to the discussion, but verbal summaries will allow meaningful participation without preparation.

NYC AND ITS ENVIRONS: PEOPLE, PLACES, THINGS

New York City is a tapestry. It is a 400year development of immigration, architecture and technology. Starting as a trading post on the tip of Manhattan, today it is a region that reaches beyond the city lines. The course explores neighborhoods and infrastructure, their history and their relationship to the city as a whole.

POETS' WORKSHOP

This workshop provides an opportunity to express your thoughts through the creative act of writing poems. You do not need prior experience in this medium. Participants share their writing with other members of the class and through constructive comments, develop their personal writing styles. Opportunities will be provided to discuss the meaning of the poems from the perspective of the authors and the readers.

QUESTER'S CHOICE

What's your personal passion? Chances are you will find it in Quester's Choice, a course featuring a broad variety of subjects. Each class will be led by a member willing to do the deep dive and then share their knowledge with us. So, join us as we journey through the endless array of topics and themes in Quester's Choice.

ROCK & ROOTS ALBUMS

Explore the roots and branches of Rock: rock, reggae, soul, blues, punk, folk, new wave, country, and metal. Each session will focus on one album by a band or solo artist and be enriched by related tracks.

SCIENCE & SCIENTISTS

This course covers a wide range of scientific topics — and the stories of the women and men who have, in the past or presently, engaged in the pursuit of knowledge about the world in which we live. No prior acquaintance with the subject of any is required. An active interest will do.



SCIENCE CLUBHOUSE

This discussion group will be a place where new developments in science can be explored and where members can bring questions about any scientific issue and all can participate in finding answers. Our scope will be broad — not just the physical and life sciences, but also psychology and cognitive science, medicine, social sciences, and any field of study which relies upon evidence. Ethical, political, and social issues related to science will be discussed.

SHAKESPEARE: CYMBELINE

Written in 1609, Cymbeline is among the last of Shakespeare's works. Its genre is perhaps best summed up by Polonius's description in Hamlet: "tragical-comical-historical-pastoral." It operates in the magical realm of romance with themes of reconciliation, restoration, and forgiveness. It is crammed with incidents and characters, and includes such theatrical effects as the entry of Jupiter upon an eagle, hurling a thunderbolt. All in all, a strange and wonderful play. The Folger Library Edition is the preferred text.

UPHEAVAL IN American Values

Each week's class will focus on one (or more) different important social and political issues, including the all-important 2024 election, that have a major impact on the state of our country, and its future. Discussion topics will include the US Constitution, the Supreme Court, changes in news reporting and the media in general, the impact of mobile phones on our children, social and income inequality, our immigration problem, free speech rights, the "woke" culture, our international relations, and, of course, politics.

WATER

Water is something we interact with every day. We wash in it, cook with it, put our waste into it, and swim in it. When it freezes, we skate, ski or sled on it. Too little water, there is a drought; too much, flood. Our bodies are mostly made up of it. Although this class started as principally science, it is interdisciplinary, and will include the arts, literature, law and history.

WOMEN SPIES NEW

The stories of hundreds of courageous women spies have been long hidden from reports of battles and war. Before and during World War II, both Allied and Axis powers trained and sent women to the war fronts in occupied territories, to conduct espionage, sabotage and reconnaissance. Initially distrusted by male colleagues, they developed wide and effective networks of spies. Employment of women as spies, of course, reaches back in history. Fascinating books, movies and TV, both fiction and nonfiction, have captivated us with stories about individual women and organizations. Who were these women? How did they operate?

WONDERFUL BOOKS OUT LOUD

O Pioneers! was Willa Cather's first great novel, and to many it remains her unchallenged masterpiece. No other work of fiction so faithfully conveys both the sharp physical realities and the mythic sweep of the transformation of the American frontier — and the transformation of the people who settled it. Participants in this class will have the pleasure of reading out loud and discussing the text. All are most welcome — to read out loud, to question, to comment, or to just listen and enjoy.

YOUNG BEETHOVEN NEW

Beethoven became a composer of the highest possible ambition and began sketches for some of his greatest music while in his teens. In our course, the first of three semesters covering Beethoven's life, we'll listen to music and discuss his beginnings, the role of family and birthplace and history, his health, his humor, his love-hate relationship with humanity, and other topics essential to appreciating Beethoven's incomparable genius.

BOOK CLUB
