A Note From the President

Spring is also the time we elect new Council members as terms of office require some to step down. This year, our Nominating and

Elections Committee (NEC) has a daunting task as they need to identify members to fill three Executive Committee positions — Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary — along with two of our Council members-atlarge members. According to our Bylaws, NEC must assure "that each candidate has valid qualifications, in the sole opinion of the NEC, to hold the position being sought, and then compiling a slate of nominees for each position."

Council is the governing and policy-making body of Quest and each Council member is elected by the membership. There are eleven members: four officers (President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer), seven members-at-large, and the immediate past president who serves as an ex-officio, nonvoting member for the year immediately following their term of office.

Requirements are simple: each candidate must be a member for at least two full semesters prior to the date of his/her assuming office as a Council member. (Presidential candidates must have served on Council but that spot isn't open this year.)

So if you're approached by an NEC member

— Paul Adler, Maureen Berman, Wayne Cotter, Leslie Goodman, or Howard Salik (Chair) — don't just say no; think about running for office because, as an all-volunteer organization, it's up to each of us to contribute in the best way we can.

Since we are beginning a new semester at Quest, I thought it a good time to offer some rules and suggestions for those members participating in hybrid classes via Zoom. We are proud to be offering 20 of our 36 courses in hybrid format this Spring. We welcome the opportunity to provide these courses to our members who are unable to attend classes at 25 Broadway and we appreciate your active participation.

We do, however, ask that you keep in mind the following:

- Identify Yourself: It's very important that your name is printed below your Zoom video panel, otherwise we won't know whether or not you're an active Quest member. If your name does not appear, the tech committee member assigned to monitor the laptop will send you a chat message asking for your name. If you fail to respond, you may be removed from the session. If you do not know how to enter your name on Zoom, the tech member can enter it, but it will only appear for that one class so please contact tech co-chairs Bob Reiss, Michael Wellner or me for instructions to permanently change your Zoom name. (You can also google how to change it.)
- **Keep Your Camera On:** We like to see your face during Zoom sessions, so we encourage you to turn on your camera. Keeping your camera on further unites us as a community.
- Questions for the Presenter: If you have a question from home, we ask that you either
 raise your electronic hand icon and turn on your camera to ask that question or use the
 "chat" function to send your question to the tech committee member who is monitoring
 the laptop. That person will then read your question to the presenter. If you don't know
 how to raise your hand icon, send a chat message to the tech committee monitor for
 instructions.
- Problems with Audio or Video: If you are having a problem seeing or hearing the
 presentation, please do not shout out from home during live sessions. Such disruptions
 can be quite distracting to presenters and the audience. Moreover, your technical problem
 may be with your own computer rather than a system-wide issue. If you are having
 trouble hearing or seeing, send a chat message to the laptop monitor.

Also, please keep in mind that although the tech committee has been overseeing the technical aspects of hybrid courses since we returned to 25 Broadway in September 2021, it is not a perfect system. The tech committee does its best to replicate the in-person experience for members at home, but neither the committee nor the Zoom system is perfect — so please be patient.

• Links: Although we email NWAQ to all members, each week's NWAQ is also posted on the Quest members' website. If you can't locate your weekly email — no worries — just access the Quest members' site. In addition, you can view a week-by-week listing of topics and presenters for most spring semester courses through the Quest website. To find such topic and presenter information, select the "Courses" tab at the top of the website and then select "Spring 2024." CultureQuest: Museum of the City of New York

ultureQuest visited the Museum of the City of New York which is celebrating the centennial anniversary of its founding. The museum has captured the hundreds of ways that New York City has captured the imagination of filmmakers, writers, artists, musicians, poets, fashion designers and urban planners over the last century. The museum's collection contains more than 750,000 objects.

This is New York: 100 Years of the City in Art and Pop Culture explores the many ways that the city has inspired storytelling across art forms and features both famous and lesser-known depictions of New York City. There are books and CD's you can position on a device that links to a large screen which transmits a short video of the book or CD.

Each borough is represented by an outline on the gallery's floor and when one steps on a specific borough, snippets of a song about that borough will be played while images or video and will be projected on the gallery wall. The gallery also features "Songs of New York," an interactive installation that touts the diversity of each borough through songs it has inspired.

The "Destination NYC" section features works by artist and photographers such as Edward Hopper, Nan Goldin and Faith Ringgold.

Another major highlight is "You Are Here," an immersive 16-screen experience comprised of more than 400 films with New York City as its essential location. One can revisit scenes from "On the Waterfront," "Taxi Driver," and even some episodes from "Sesame Street" to name just a few. This film montage is simply breathtaking. One of my favorite desserts growing up was grape nut pudding, a New England staple for many years. The dessert emerged in the early part of the 20th century, shortly after Grape-Nuts cereal was introduced in 1897 by cereal maker C W. Post.

Grape nut pudding is made primarily with milk, cream, eggs, vanilla extract, brown sugar, and of course a hefty portion of Grape-Nuts cereal. It can be served cold or hot (when served hot, top it with a dollop of vanilla ice cream). It is still a featured dessert at the Cowesett Inn in West Warwick, Rhode Island.
