have been a member of Quest since the fall of 2014. At that time, I was still working with my son David in our immigration law practice, so I could only attend Quest classes part of the day. My career as an Immigration lawyer spanned almost 40 years in New York City. On my very first day at Quest, I presented on US Immigration at a Noontime Knowledge class.



I want to be Vice-President of Quest, so I can support Donna and the rest of the Council in their efforts to make Quest the best lifelong learning organization it can be. It is very important for Quest to have a Vice-President capable of stepping in for the President, in case of illness or injury of the President. I qualify for that role having served as Vice-President of Quest from 2016 to 2017, and President of Quest from 2017-2021. Since leaving the Council, I have been an active member of the Curriculum, Scheduling, and Special Events Committees. I have also been the lead coordinator of Foreign Affairs, Folk Music and Mellow Rock, and Questers Choice courses. I have made numerous presentations in a wide variety of courses since 2015.

Peter Fleischman Treasurer (Incumbent)

was born in Manhattan to immigrant parents who escaped the Nazis. We moved to New Rochelle when I was three, and I lived there until I went to college.

I developed an early interest in math and science and maintained that interest through high school and beyond. I was accepted at MIT where I studied mathematics and computer science. Upon



graduating, I started a job with a tech company, and I went to business school at night at NYU where I received my MBA.

I started my career in information technology as a programmer and never strayed too far from technology as I worked for firms that served technology, financial and healthcare clients. My job titles included project manager, sales manager, general manager, VP, and chief operating officer. I approached every job with a quantitative "bent", but also with a human approach that I learned from my management roles and from my wife, who is a psychologist.

As a Quest member, I have enjoyed the variety of courses offered, and enjoyed teaching as well. For the past two years, I have served as Treasurer. I've provided Council with accurate information about our income and expenses as well as the performance of our investments. Among my accomplishments are:

- Streamlined the process by which we deposit tuition checks. It now takes a few days to do what used to take weeks or months.
- We used to have to ask CWE for money to use for our expenses, and that often took weeks and didn't always result in our receiving the money we requested. We now have a process by which we receive these funds on a regular basis.
- I have created reports that provide a monthly comparison of income and expenses to budget.
- Our investments are now exclusively in U.S. Treasuries, which
 provide more liquidity than CDs. Our interest income now makes
 a significant contribution to Quest's finances. In addition, I have
 created a treasury "ladder" which will provide Quest with greater
 interest income for a year or more after interest rates decline.

I was asked by several Council members to run for Treasurer again, and am doing so in order to maintain the improvements I've already made, and to continue to improve the information provided to Council and membership.

I've gotten a lot from my membership in Quest and look forward to continuing to give back to Quest as Treasurer.

Now that I have my feet wet on the presenting side, I would like to help on the admin side of Quest and so am running for the Council position of Secretary. I think I have the experience to be a good Secretary and Council member. In addition to serving on a couple of charity boards, I served on the board of my coop for five years, the last two as President, and on the board of a private resort community in the Poconos for three years. Also, as general counsel to a federal savings bank in the late 1990s and a small broker-dealer in the early 2000s, I have counseled boards and executives and overseen the corporate secretary function.

More generally, as a council member, I hope to serve the Quest community by helping to further Quest's goal of offering high quality peer-to-peer learning in a community devoted to education and fellowship.



Vincent Grosso Member-at-Large


was born and raised in Williamsburg, Brooklyn and attended Pace

In 2022, I discovered Quest and knew from the moment that I joined, the organization and I were a perfect fit. I appreciate and frequently participate in social opportunities at Quest, including CultureQuest, Solemates and Q'xtra events, enjoying getting to know Questers in different settings.

Judy Winn Member-at-Large

am originally from Philadelphia. I earned a bachelor's degree from Temple University, got married and had two children. When my children were in pre-school, I went back to Temple and earned a master's degree and a PhD in Educational Psychology. I then began a 35-year career working in community college education.



My first job was as a Professor of Education and Psychology at Community College of Philadelphia, where I became the Director of the Division of Social and Behavioral Sciences and Human Service Careers. I moved on to become the Vice President and Dean of the College at Burlington County College in New Jersey. After nine years in New Jersey, I moved to Texas and served as President of Northwest College, which is part of the Houston Community College System. My next job was President of Bergen Community College in Paramus, New Jersey, a position I held for 12 years until I retired in 2007. Bergen Community College enrolls approximately 14,000 students in college credit courses each year and about 8000 students a year in non-credit continuing education courses. In my last year as President, I oversaw a \$100 million dollar budget, 700 full-time employees and 400 part-time employees.

After I retired, I moved to Brooklyn Heights to be closer to family and I became a member of Quest eight years ago. I made presentations in a number of courses and served on the Curriculum Committee for four years. I have been lead coordinator of Poets' Workshop since the Spring of 2020. I am completing my first two-year term on Quest Council. I believe my extensive administrative experience has been of benefit to the Council and I would like to continue as a Council member-at-large for another two years.

My most rewarding retirement activity has been serving as a volunteer for resettling refugees in New York City. The team with which I work has resettled three young men from Afghanistan. These men were brought to NYC through HIAS (Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society) and assigned to my volunteer group. Our job is to get them housing, jobs, phone plans, subway cards, medical care and everything else they need. They are all now working and need less financial assistance from us, but continue to rely on us in managing daily living challenges.


In case you missed it, on March 15th, Molly Wohlforth, our educator for the hour, took us on a virtual tour through the life and works of Marta Minujin.

Rocking the Art World at 80, Marta is finally getting her due at her first exhibit at the Jewish Museum.

Arte! Arte! Arte! includes nearly 100 works organized to reflect Marta's bold experimentation over six decades into all phases of the artist's career.

Curator Darsie Alexander spearheaded the exhibit, which pays tribute to recognizing the works of people that are at the end of their careers while also focusing on younger artists.

The exhibition charts Minujin's influential career in Buenos Aires as well as time spent in Paris from 1960–63 where she became friends with Jean Tinguely, Robert Rauschenberg, Christo, and other new realist artists. In New York, she forged a friendship with Andy Warhol. Through a range of pioneering, mattress-based soft sculptures, large-scale paintings, psychedelic drawings and performances, and vintage film footage, the artist's ephemeral works — happenings, participatory installations, and monumental public art — are her way of thinking about art and its enjoyment, but also about human behavior. Since 1980 she has continued to perform events drawing on massive public participation much like Christo's 2005 fabric gates winding 23 miles through Central Park. We all remember the thrill of walking under those orange colored gates.


