If you thought two octogenarians could never create a chart-topping rock 'n' roll record, then we guess you haven't heard "Hackney Diamonds" by the Rolling Stones. Yes, last year Mick Jagger and Keith Richards got the old band back together and released the group's first studio album of original material in 18 years. The LP was both a critical and commercial success.

The album's 34-year-old producer, Andrew Watt, who hails from Great Neck, is credited with helping the Stones recreate the rawness and energy of some of their masterpieces from the '60s and '70s. Most of the album was recorded in the legendary Electric Lady Studio in Greenwich Village. The album, which reached #1 in Britain and #3 in the United States, features guest appearances by Paul McCartney, Stevie Wonder, Elton John and Lady Gaga.

We rarely cover LPs released in the 21st Century in this course, but for this instant classic, we have made an exception. It's only rock 'n' roll, but we like it!
