Join us in exploring this remarkable woman who embodied courage, fortitude, and a whole lot of chutzpah!

NYC has had many famous Mayors. Among them, perhaps none is more famous or revered than Fiorello LaGuardia who served as the 99<sup>th</sup> Mayor from 1934-1946. We will look at how LaGuardia and President Franklin D. Roosevelt (a former Governor of NY) worked together to pull NYC out of the depths of the depression. Together they created what was essentially a new city by combining Federal money with NY ingenuity and vision.

In our last two classes of the term, we will discuss Michael Cunningham's 1999 Pulitzer Prize winning novel, *The Hours*, which relates to *Mrs. Dalloway* and follows three women during the course of one day. This novel is easier and quicker to read than *Mrs. Dalloway*. We will cover about half the book, ending with a chapter on "Mrs. Woolf" for our class on April 21. Cunningham envisions a modern-day Clarissa living in New York. What is similar and different between his depiction and that of Virginia Woolf's? Can you recognize other characters that relate to those of Woolf's? Cunningham imagines a young woman, Laura Brown, who is struggling to accept her role as a suburban wife and mother. How does reading *Mrs. Dalloway* and her knowledge about Virginia Woolf affect her? Virginia Woolf is also a character in the book, and Cunningham cleverly includes facts about her with what he imagines she might have thought and felt as she wrote *Mrs. Dalloway*.

Of his *New Selected Poems* (Gallery Books, 2016), Seamus Heaney wrote: "There is a copiousness and excitement about these poems that is to be found only in work of the highest order." High praise, indeed!

Story focuses on Pam, who is in her early 50s, still single. She's realized that the man she loves will always put his ex-wife and teenaged daughter first. Is it a deal breaker? What do you think?"
